### **MIXED CABLE WAKEBOARD TEAM ANNOUNCED FOR 2025 SEA GAMES**

The Singapore Waterski & Wakeboard Federation (SWWF) has officially announced the athletes who will represent Singapore at the 33rd Southeast Asian (SEA) Games in Thailand for the Mixed Cable Wakeboard Team Event. In line with competition's entry quota, the team will consist of three male and three female riders, selected to showcase Singapore's talent in this fast-growing wake sport discipline.

As the event draws closer, it is important to highlight what makes Cable Wakeboarding unique. It is a dynamic sport where athletes are pulled by an overhead cable system. Each competitor is judged on a combination of style, difficulty, and execution as they perform tricks on ramps, rails, and in the air. The discipline demands precision, creativity, and consistency under pressure.

Singapore's Cable Wakeboard national team features a mix of seasoned athletes such as Clarence Aloysious Batchelor and Nurul Farhan Misran bin Misran, who both competed in the 2019 SEA Games, as well as promising newcomers Chia Teck Ian, Tara Lim, Tyan Foong, and Isabella Tan, who will be making their SEA Games debuts.

Tara Lim said: *“I’m truly grateful to be selected for the SEA Games and to represent Singapore in a sport I love. My journey in wakeboarding has been exciting, challenging, and sometimes intimidating, but it has taught me to step out of my comfort zone and overcome my fears. I wouldn’t be here without the incredible support of my family and the community at Singapore Wake Park.”*

Chia Teck Ian added: *“I started Cable Wakeboarding about four years ago and it has become my passion. The thrill of just getting out on the water motivates me to ride as often as I can. Being selected to compete in the SEA Games is something I’m so grateful for, and I wish to do my best for my team, family, and the wakeboard community. I hope our performance at the SEA Games can also inspire more Singaporeans to take up this sport.”*

For those who are interested in trying out Cable Wakeboarding, Long Hatta, owner of the Singapore Wake Park, said: *“Wakeboarding may look intimidating at first, but with our beginner-friendly System A, it’s easier than most people expect — and incredibly rewarding. Beyond the thrill of riding, wakeboarding is about community, friendship, and shared passion. I encourage everyone to give it a try and even take part in local competitions, which are a great way to build confidence and connect with fellow riders.”*

The Singapore national team will continue their preparations at Singapore Wake Park until their departure for Thailand in December 2025. With a rigorous training schedule that combines four weekly on-water sessions and gym work, the athletes are fully committed to sharpening their skills and are determined to deliver a strong performance at the SEA Games.

*“This is the strongest line-up Singapore has ever fielded for Cable Wakeboard at the SEA Games. Each of them brings talent, dedication, and a winning spirit, and we are confident they are well-placed to challenge for the podium,”* said Marcus Lee, Vice-President of SWWF.
